From Lorraine Heath

Firstly the Association has not paid for 3 computers over the last five years, they paid for 1 and I donated the other two when we had problems on the computers so all up we only ever paid \$500 for computers when I first started the Tournament Directors position. As for printers, we used the one given to us from Les till it gave up and we had to rush out at Porirua and buy a new one which cost us at the time I think \$40 the only reason we are looking at buying another cheap printer now is to go wireless, which the printer we have cannot do.

Yes we have now brought an up to date computer for whoever takes over from me as Tournament Director (as mine is on its last legs) and it will have the new program installed on it.

The \$3000 is what not only the delegates but also the members of 55+ Association have agreed to pay for a new website to be produced after the 30th September, when Les's website will no longer be available to the Association.

I know I have given in my resignation as Tournament Director and a new one will be decided at Invercargill in a special General Meeting, which is the correct procedure to do this, but the 55+ Association have my full support in what they are trying to do which is "bring the society into the present time, It will be so much easier with the new programme being produced which will also link straight up to the website.

I personally thank Les Stewart for all his work and help since I have been Tournament Director but surely he also can see it is time to update the system.

I don't know what else I can say but thank you 55+ Association Members for the last 5 years. It has been great working for all the members.

Presidents comment on items from Beverley Stuart

I reluctantly feel the need to respond to the item submitted to the newsletter and published under the heading Honorary Members Corner.

Unfortunately the article contains statements which are factually incorrect, comments which are made on incorrect assumptions and is not in line with the spirit of the 55+ Tenpin Bowling Association of New Zealand.

Lorraine in her response has outlined the correct position re the computers and printers. With regard to the website, now is the time for members to find out the full story.

For some years the delegates have been uncomfortable that only Les could update the website. That put the Association at some risk and that risk was highlighted during the time of Les's ill health. We offered to have someone understudy Les so his good work with the Website could be continued. That offer was declined.

Then at our delegates meeting in Hastings we were advised that the website was going to be "turned off after the Invercargill Tournament"

The delegates unanimously agreed that:

- 1) The Association needed a robust, modern website.
- 2) That the Association would never again be put in the position where one person controlled the website.
- 3) That the Association needed a professionally developed website developed using industry standard tools which could be, if necessary, picked up and updated by any developer.

- 4) The website needed appropriate security.
- 5) That the Association would always have at least two members who could access and update the website.

Yes we could have had a friend of a member do something cheaper, but we would have only found ourselves in the same position. So we agreed on a professionally developed site. And yes that will, be more expensive, but we will have something which is not one person dependent.

Yes to some extent we are reinventing the wheel, but with a much more up to date version, and we had no choice, as we were told the website was to be turned off.

After Les advised us that the Web site was to be turned off we had no further need to discuss the matter with him, so I cannot understand the need for the last paragraph in Beverley's article.

Les did a great job in establishing the 55+ Tenpin Bowling Association of NZ and his work with the website was, at its inception, ahead of its times and it has served the Association well over the years.

To me, it is a shame that all that good work is being overshadowed by comments such as the articles in this newsletter and the previous one.

Our Delegates have one thing in mind, namely the future of the 55+ Tenpin Bowling Association of New Zealand.

As long as I am President we will make decisions which enhance the future of the Association and we will not allow it to return to the position where it is not in control of all aspects of it activities. We are prepared to make the hard decisions to ensure that the Association is viable and successful in the future.
